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

Osterer at it again: 'serendipitous' Star Trek project goes full circle

Merivale High School, located in Nepean (now part of the City of Ottawa), has a local reputation of offering the region's best arts program. Nation-wide, it's recognized for its endeav-

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Lot 15 featured a strip of four half-cent black Large Queens to make up the two-cent soldier's rate on an 1869 letter from Hamilton to a soldier in India. The soldier was declared dead, which was written in heavy manuscript on the cover. It turned out, however, the soldier was alive and the family kept the letter as a novelty. It sold for \$50,000.



Royal returns to Kitchener-Waterloo after 66 years

This August, after 66 years, "Canada's national stamp exhibition" is returning to Kitchener-Waterloo.

It was late April, 1960 – less than one year after the Canadian Philatelic Society earned its "Royal" designation from then-Governor General Vincent Massey – when the Kitchener-Waterloo area last played host to Canada's big show.

For this year's 88th Convention of The Royal Philatelic Society of Canada (RPSC), scheduled to take place Aug. 19-21, organizers are hoping current Governor General David Johnston will accept their invitation to attend.

"The Governor General is a patron of the Royal as well as a former resident of Waterloo, and a former president of the University of Waterloo," said RPSC President George Pepall, who added organizers are trying to add some emphasis to this connection. "One of the

ovals on our second show card says 'David Johnston Research and Technology Park.' We're really hoping he attends."

David Johnston Research and Technology Park, located at 340 Hagey Blvd. in Waterloo, was named after Johnston and introduced during his 11-year presidency at University of Waterloo.

"What we're trying to do is show Kitchener-Waterloo in the 21st century rather than the early 20th century," said Pepall, adding the society is "working hard" to build a good program and promote the show. "Every Tuesday since March, I and six others on the organizing committee meet for two hours."
